
Our deep appreciation to the communities we work with for welcoming us into their lives and for giving us the opportunity to partner with them inworking towards a just, responsible and compassionate society.





EFICOR organised its 6th Staff Family Conference at Hotel Anand Aamod and Wild Crest Resort in Ramnagar, Uttarakhand from May 19-22, 2016. The Staff Family Conference is an event held once in four years for all EFICOR staff and families. The main objectives of the Conference are to enable staff to experience spiritual edification, to understand EFICOR's overall work and for staff and their families to have fellowship with one another. The 2016 Conference was particularly significant as we commemorate 50 years of Compassionate service in the nation by 2017. In total, 323 members (129 staff and their families, 9 resource people) attended the Conference.

The theme of the Conference was "Be the Epistle of Christ" and Rev. Sudhakar Mondithoka and his wife, Mrs. Santha Mondithoka led 5 sessions based on the Conference theme.. Mr. Haiguangteung and Mrs. Romilu Pame led the children's sessions. Mr. Dennis Babu and his friends led the youth group. 27 staff with varying years of services were felicitated for their committed service in EFICOR. All EFICOR projects got the opportunity to share their work with colleagues and families through an exhibition organised to showcase their work.

#### Children's Parliament:

EFICOR's Musahar Sustainable Development Project, Bihar formed Children's Parliament in 6 villages to be an agent of development with 180 students. The Children Parliament elected their cabinets and head of opposition to lead the concept of child rights & responsibility in a smaller village level unit. Through them, awareness on Community Health & Sanitation, Value education and Environment Protection were created. They cleaned villages and planted trees.



### InDEEP 2017

InDEEP (India Development Education Experience Program) 2017, was held from 6th January 2017 to 24th February 2017. It is an exposure trip to India organized in partnership with EFICOR and TEAR Australia for TEAR's supporters to learn more about the poverty and development by visiting TEAR supported Project and to advocate for the world's poor. The participants became the agents of change for development in their life.



### Youth Day Celebration

7 children from Tuition Centre of EFICOR's Asha Slum Development Project, Delhi received the certificates for their participation in the painting, dance and debate competitions of Youth Day Celebration held on (11-12) January 2017 organised by Vishwa Yuvak Kendra, New Delhi. The project intervention in the Krishna Colony (Kalibasti) and Indira Camp Slum of Delhi among the migrants brought significant changes in the life of the school dropout children through the Kids Club and Tuition Centre.

# Educating, Influencing & Shaping Policies



# Goal 1: To establish a Centre of Excellence for social transformation.

### 1. Social Worker Training.

49 participants of Faith Based Organisations (FBOs) completed all the three phases of Social Worker training held in 3 locations - Delhi, Nabarangpur (Odisha) and Ratlam (Madhya Pradesh). Participants were trained on varied topics of Theories, Approaches and Principles of Development, Societal Analysis, Advocacy, Environment issues, Government schemes, HIV & AIDS, Self Help Groups etc.

### Achievements: Key Highlights

The efforts of the trained Social worker resulted in

- 94 SHGs formed and 86 SHGs linked with nationalized bank for loans at subsidized rate.
- 6 villages of Orissa State facilitated to get electricity connection and 2 streets lights.
- Facilitated construction of 133 toilets under Swach Bharat Abhiyan.
- Facilitated readmission of 153 school drop out children in schools.
- Some Social workers Trainees funded from their own money school fees for 27 students, college fees for 13 students, school bags and notebooks for 543 students and umbrella for rainy season to 122 students.

### 2. Issue Based Training

49 participants of Issue Based Training formerly known as Community Transformation completed the training conducted at three national levels on the topics of Project Management, Monitoring and Evaluation and NGO Management. 119 participants were trained at four regional level trainings in partnership with Indian Mission Society (IMS) in Rajasthan, Indian Evangelical Mission (IEM) Karnataka, Nai Asha Society, Allahabad UP and Indian Christian Revival Mission (ICRM), Mysore, Karnataka.

### Achievements: Key Highlights

- 3 Self Help Groups were formed.
- 10 Faith Based Organisations (FBOs) planted trees and their members adopted the plants.
- The participants of Indian Mission Society (IMS) supported one HIV positive girl.

### 3. Parivartan Programme (Umoja Model)

Since 2013, EFICOR has been involved in implementing Parivartan training programme with 30 Faith Based Organisations (FBOs) in 6 States namely Bihar, Delhi, Himachal Pradesh, Jharkhand, Uttar Pradesh and Uttarakhand. As a result of this, many positive changes have taken place in the communities.

#### Achievements: Key Highlights


- 4 Self Help Groups (SHGs) were formed in Jharkhand, 19 in Bihar (one exclusively for the differently abled people), 1 in Uttarakhand and 1 in Himachal Pradesh.
- In Punjab, the efforts of the people in submitting written application for road construction resulted in the government sanctioning Rs. 9,00,000.
- In Jharkhand, the people efforts resulted in building of bridges for 2 villages.
- In Bihar, 60 families facilitated to construct toilets and 50 families got electricity connections.

### **Impact Story**



Mr. Lalu Das, a Training Facilitator of the Parivartan training programme noticed that there were many poor people in his remote village who do not have a bank account to access Government schemes and entitlements. Even to go to the nearest bank it takes about half a day. In spite of that, he helped many people open their account. Impressed by his commitment and hard work, the Vijaya Bank Manager offered him a part time job called "Bank's Mitra" (Business correspondent) with Rs. 5000 as monthly honorarium. As a result of this, the Bank Sub Branch was opened in his village and many of his villagers benefitted from it. He is also earning Rs. 5000 monthly as honorarium. He thanks EFICOR for the Parivartan training programme.

### Achievement of Training Programmes





#### Drishtikone

EFICOR publishes "Drishtikone" (which means perspective in Hindi) magazine to influence and mobilize Christian reflections and actions on social issues. Reaching 9000 readers with dialogue and reflection from development practitioners, theologians, research scholars, grass root workers and others, Drishtikone strives to expand the understanding of our readers to what it means to be part of the Kingdom and work towards a just, responsible and compassionate society.

#### Research

The Research programme has been able to influence programme formulation process in EFICOR collecting and analyzing baseline data and gave wider impact on social issues through dissemination. It also gave awareness to the Development Workers, Members and Leaders of Faith Based Organisations (FBOs), EFICOR leadership and Community Members with which EFICOR is involved.

#### Achievement: Key Highlights

- Completed impact assessment of 4 EFICOR projects (Kukna, Koya, Malto, and Sahyog project), which was completed 3-4 years back.
- Research paper on coping with climate change was published in Economic and Political Weekly magazine (EPW), December 24, 2016 issue.
- An article "Rumble of a scary thunder" in Outlook Magazine referred EFICOR's research paper.
- Impact assessment done on Families for life (FFL) project Salem, Namakkal, Dharmapuri and Krishnagiri districts of Tamil Nadu.
- 1 research on the socio-economic condition of Afghans in Delhi to highlight their conditions, needs, and challenges faced by Afghans living in Delhi completed.

### MA in Mission and Development Practice

The Seventh Batch of M.A in Mission and Development Practice, which started in 2014 in affiliation with Martin Luther Christian University, Shillong completed their course. This has made an impact in the lives of many full time workers who joined the course. 7 students of the Seventh Batch graduated and attended the convocation during August 2016 at Martin Luther Christian University in Shillong.

#### Network

EFICOR participated in Candle Light vigil held on 2nd December 2016 conducted by PUSH at Connaught Circus, Delhi. PUSH is a network of FBOs and churches based in Delhi. EFICOR is also a member of other networks like WANGO, VANI, Micah Global, Coalition for Food and Nutrition Society(CFNS), CANSA and Sphere India. EFICOR actively participated in NGO Consultations conducted by VANI. EFICOR is represented in the Executive Committee of Sphere India and Micah Global and National Steering Committee of CANSA.



Goal 2: To enhance the resilience and quality of life of the vulnerable and needy.

### Livelihood

EFICOR's 10 Sustainable livelihood projects in 195 villages work with some of the most vulnerable and marginalized communities including tribal communities namely Barela, Bhil, Chenchu, Gond, Kondh, Korku and other discriminated castes such as Musahars in Madhya Pradesh, Andhra Pradesh, Odisha and Bihar.

- The agricultural trainings linked with Krishi Vigyan Kendra (KVK) conducted for 5266 farmers on new method of agriculture.
- 1378 farmers practicing double cropping which increased agricultural yield, leading to food security. This in turn led to reduction in migration and also stopped people from borrowing from money lenders at high rate of interest, thereby leading to formation of 165 seed banks with 373478 kilograms of seeds for seed banks.

- 351 Self Help Groups (SHGs) with 3887 members formed with an accumulated saving of Rs. 58,73,497
- Some SHG groups are linked to National Rural Livelihood Mission (NRLM), Rajasthan Rural
- Livelihood Programme and 99 SHGs accessed loans from them.
- As a result, 1227 SHGs members could obtain loans for Income Generation Programme (IGP) leading to sustainable livelihood with a monthly profit of Rs. 1,80,322.


### **Impact Story**

Mr. Gangji has 4 bighas cultivable land but the yields for the past years were too meagre to feed 11 members of his family. This forced him to migrate to other States to work as a labourer with his two married sons to eke out a living. But this is past. Mr. Gangji harvested this year 400 kgs maize, 50 kgs rice, 400 kgs wheat, and various kinds of vegetable above 50 kgs each from the same 4 bighas land. This transformation was possible after the adoption of learning from the training of climate adaptive farming conducted by staff of EFICOR's Dungarpur Sustainable Development project. Now, Gangji and his sons are not migrating anymore as they are busy in their farming and have enough food for the family for the entire year.

### Achievements of Livelihood Programmes





### Anti Human Trafficking Intervention Project

Human trafficking is a form of modern day slavery in which trafficker uses force, fraud, coercion or deception to control victims for the purpose of engaging in commercial sex acts or labour service against his/her will. For the rural Indian population, trafficking is closely linked with migration which leads them to move out of their villages as bonded labourers or forced labourers due to recurrent natural calamities or crop failure which leads them to chronic poverty and family displacements.

EFICOR in partnership with JVI (Justice Venture International) started an Intervention Project from August 2016 to work closely on prevention and rescue of human trafficking cases. The Intervention project's operational locations include, Delhi NCR, Ghaziabad, Meerut, Noida, parts of Uttar Pradesh and Haryana.

- 51 bonded Child labourers and 2 adults were rescued from 3 locations namely Jafarabad, Sarai Kale Khan and New Usmanpur in New Delhi working in hazardous conditions, engaged in bangles making, hardware articles, embroidery (Zari) work and domestic works.
- The project facilitated to open the bank account to transfer the compensation for 30 children who have been rescued.
- 34 children are re-enrolled in the schools and parents are able to support these children after counselling and sensitisation to the family.
- 8 children availed release certificate from SDM Seelampur for further compensation.



### **Urban Poverty**

EFICOR's intervention in 3 urban slum Projects in Delhi is focussed on building Self Help Groups (SHGs), advocating and facilitating Community/Slumdwellers to access their rights and entitlements for identity documents, birth certificates, ration cards, government schemes, pensions, disability certificates etc. Tuition centres, kids club for school dropout children and poor children are functioning to help them cope with the education as most of the parents are away during the day to earn their living. The efforts of the three projects resulted in changing the lives of many vulnerable and marginalized people.

- 199 children enrolled in tuition centres and kids club are taught the basic spoken English, maths, hygiene, moral values and general knowledge. Their learnings from the centres enabled them to do well in their studies, clear the written test and interview for admissions.
- As most of the kids are school drop outs, they are motivated to go back to school thereby leading to reenrolment of 78 school drop outs kids in various government and private schools.
- 2912 people facilitated to get identity proof documents and certificates. The legal documents enabled them to open bank accounts, apply for schemes and entitlements.
- 39 people facilitated for Income Generation Programme (IGP) and life skills trainings for their livelihood and they now have businesses of their own. Some of them are working in companies and parlours and are earning regular income and have a sustainable lives.
- 330 people obtained legal documents birth & caste certificates, Aadhar cards, ration cards.

### **Impact Story**



When Mr. Surender got married at a young age of 21 years, he was uneducated and had no skill to earn a regular income. Due to poverty, he had to do menial work at less wages to make ends meet. Surviving in a city like Delhi became very difficult and he had lost hope. It was then, Mr. Surender got introduced to staff of EFICOR's Asha Slum Development Project, Delhi and they enrolled him for a vocational course in ALPS Institute to learn hair cutting. Soon after he completed the training, he got a job in a parlour at Dwarka, Delhi with a monthly salary of Rs. 10,000. It was a dream come true for Mr. Surender to earn with skilled labour.


### Disability

EFICOR's three disability projects provide career guidance & counseling, soft skills training, job placements services to Persons with Disabilities facilitating assistive devices entitlements to PWDs. EFICOR's engagement with PWDs has impacted many lives.

### Achievements: Key Highlights

- 99 Persons with disabilities (PWDs) who received Self Employment support for income generation started their own shops like tailoring, cycle repairing, parlours, mobile repairing and are earning sustainable income.
- 421 persons with disabilities were supported with vocational and foundation trainings and got placement in some companies like Concentrix, Apollo, Dell International, Deki Electronics, Hotel Lemon tree, Max, Bajaj Capital, Ageis etc.
- 30 persons were facilitated to get assistive devices like tricycle, Wheelchair, Clutches, White Cane, Motor ride, Artifical Limb. With this support, these persons with disabilities will travel freely without any help.

#### **Impact Story**



Mr. Prem Prakash Prasad got visually impaired when he was 3 yrs old after a fire accident. Since his family is very poor and finding it difficult to support his education, he came to pursue his studies at Industrial Blind Institute and hostel in Begumpur in Malviya Nagar, New Delhi. After completing his 12th Standard, he wanted to make a living to support himself. But owing to his visual impairment, he could not get a job anywhere and felt very disheartened. But things took a good turn when he met the EU LRC staff. After they counselled him he underwent the Ready to Succeed Training on Life Skills, Numeracy, Basic IT, Wage and Self Employment. Then he got selected for Vodafone Voice process and, now he is earning Rs. 7000 per month.

#### Health


#### Maternal Newborn and Child Health (MNCH)

EFICOR implemented 5 MNCH projects in 2878 villages in the districts of Damoh, Khandwa, Panna and Satna districts of Madhya Pradesh and Jalore district of Rajasthan to reduce mortality among mothers, newborns and children under the age of two and improved nutritional status among children less than two years of age through building and sustaining community capacity.

#### Achievements: Key Highlights

- 33470 pregnant women facilitated to have access to 4 antenatal cares during their pregnancy.
- 26583 pregnant women facilitated for institutional delivery.
- 33160 children less than 2 years of age could receive full immunization.
- 3018 children referred to Nutrition Rehabilitation Centre (NRC).
- Due to increase in number of referral of malnourished children to NRC, department has been compelled to increase the number of beds from 15 to 25 in the Majhgawa block (NRC).
- Jeevan Jyoti project is nominated as a team member for the District Task Force Committee by the Collector & District Magistrate, Satna for monitoring of various maternal & child survival activities in the district.

#### Community Health



### **Impact Story**



Sant Kumar a 2 year 7 months old boy was severely malnourished, stunted in growth from birth. When Panna Parivartan MCH Project's staff came to know that Sant Kumar's weight was only 6.400 kilograms they counseled his parents for admission in Nutrition Rehabilitation Centre (NRC). Sant Kumar was facilitated for admission in the NRC at Panna on 17th October 2016. After 14 days of good care at the NRC, Sant Kumar's weight increased to 6.985 Kilograms. Seeing the improvement in their child's weight, timely help and the health information imparted to them by the Project staff, the parents realised that it's not only their poverty but also ignorance that had led to stunted growth of their child and are ever thankful to EFICOR for the timely counseling.

### **HIV & AIDS**

EFICOR has been involved in the target locations of Chennai, Valliyoor, Walajah and surrounding area in Vellore in Tamil Nadu, Chirala and Vetapalem administrative divisions, Prakasham district of Andhra Pradesh, Aizawl district of Mizoram, Vidhabva region (Nagpur and surrounding areas) of Maharashtra and four districts of Bihar over a period of time through a three-fold approach of prevention, care & support and advocacy.

In order to provide financial and social security to the people infected and affected by HIV&AIDS and to make them independent over a period of time, EFICOR with the help of the community moved ahead from 2016 with a livelihood approach by ensuring consistent and continuous engagement, accessibility to resources and market and usability of income to fulfill their family and community responsibilities.

- 225 families supported through Income Generation Programme are engaged in various activities such as sewing, cloth business, running petty shops & tiffin centres, selling fruits & vegetables, rice business, livestock rearing etc and are able to lead a relatively better and stress free life due to sustainable income.
- 255 People Living with HIV & AIDS (PLHAs) have accessed welfare schemes such as widow pensions, Orphan and Vulnerable Children (OVC) assistance for children, Indira Awaas Yojana (IAY), Public Distribution Scheme (PDS), free bus/ train pass etc regularly.
- 290 PLHAs families received nutrition support to cope and sustain the infected person's health.
- 237 children who are either infected or affected by HIV received educational support to continue schooling.
- Community leaders and Faith Based Organisations (FBOs) facilitated children who who are either infected or affected by HIV who passed 10th Board Exam successfully.
- 751 PLHAs families are linked with 149 FBOs and 239 caregivers for regular care and support.
- Among 35 Support Groups (SGs), 5 Support Groups were evolved as Self help Groups (SHGs).

# Families for Life: Strengthening Families - Preventing HIV/AIDS.

EFICOR's Families for Life Project mobilized and empowered local Faith Based Organisations (FBOs) in target locations of four districts (Dharmapuri, Namakkal, Krishnagiri and Salem) in Tamil Nadu, one of the epicenters of India's HIV epidemic region. It worked towards strengthening marriages, caring for those affected by AIDS, and preventing the spread of HIV.

Through couples focused interventions, EFICOR is addressing the root cause of HIV/AIDS—broken relationships. It also strengthens families through 'Sangeetham Training' by transforming relationships, empowering women, and strengthening communities.

#### Achievements: Key Highlights


- 46 couples (community leaders) were trained in Training of Trainers (TOT) workshop.
- 416 people reached with HIV/AIDS awareness programme.

When Mrs. Santhi (name changed) lost her husband due to AIDS related diseases and later diagnosed with HIV positive status, she lost all hope in her life. EFICOR's partner AIRD enrolled her in the care and support group which improved her health and instilled new hope in her. With the financial and technical support of AIRD for Income Generation Programme, she resumed her tailoring work. Her income from tailoring enabled her to take care of herself, her ailing father and have some savings. She received assistance from her support group and she is now an active member of her support group.

### Disaster Risk Reduction

EFICOR's Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR) programme focuses on reducing the vulnerability of communities living in flood prone areas of Samastipur, Madhepura and Madhubani Districts of Bihar and drought affected Chitrakoot District of Uttar Pradesh, Khandwa District of Madhya Pradesh, and Dungarpur District of Rajasthan. The projects built the capacity of the community by setting up preparedness plan/ contingency plan for emergency situation. In addition disaster preparedness and mitigation, livelihood and advocacy programmes were also taken up.

- 3 Water Harvesting Structures (WHS) were constructed. It generated employment for 86 families through cash for work, thereby leading to 30% reduction in migration.
- 50 villages have contingency plan to face droughts and have started seed banks.
- One flood shelter to accommodate 100 people in an emergency situation constructed in Khairi Musahari village of Madhepur Block in Madhubani district in Bihar.
- As part of mitigation measure 5 evacuation routes constructed in 5 villages in Hasanpur block of Bihar for safe evacuation during floods.
- 84 acres of land treated has enabled farmers to have 42 acres of extra cultivable land which led to average 35% increase in crop yield. The number of people who had migrated dropped to 55 from 500
- 200 marginal farmers are doing double cropping leading to increase agricultural yield and food security, an income.
- 2 Gram Panchayats, (Aura & Devra) contingency plans were prepared and were handed over to Block Development Officer(BDO) for approval at the block level.

### **Impact Story**



Ms. Mala Kumari, a timid 17 year old girl, Class X student is a transformed person after her heroic act of saving a 3 year old boy Raman Kumar Yadav from drowning in the river Gehunwa. Before she joined the Task Force Group, she had seen several flood situations but was not aware of disaster related issues and surrendered to the fate thinking nothing can change. She narrated that her confidence was built after she underwent the Task Force Member Training conducted by EFICOR's Madhepur Natural Disaster Risk Reduction Project.

### **Emergency Response**

EFICOR's relief operations adhere to Core Humanitarian Standards and Sphere Standards. Vulnerable people among the affected to were always given priority. Persons with Disability (PWD), widows, women headed families and aged are people of focus. Need assessments are done by staff keeping in mind the culture, customs, living conditions, and food habits of the affected community. EFICOR staff verifies beneficiaries' lists and relief cards are distributed. List of relief items provided are displayed prominently to allow verification by community members. Records of beneficiaries scrupulously maintained with signatures and a complaint/suggestion box is placed in a common community place, visible to everyone during the relief distribution for feedback. EFICOR staff check all complaints and suggestions, correct errors and inform the Inter Agency Group after completion to avoid duplication.


- Totally five relief operations were conducted.
- Three fire relief operations in Madhepur Block, in Madhubani District, Bihar, Chakiya Block in East Champaran district, Bihar and in Delhi.
  - o 700 families affected by fire were provided with food items consisting of dry food items consisting of rice, wheat flour, dal (lentils) cooking oil, salt, gram flour, flattened rice and sugar.
- One flood relief operation was conducted in Madhubani district in Bihar
  - o 3400 families consisting of 175 widows and 60 persons with disabilities were provided with relief kit.
  - o The food items provided consisted of rice, wheat flour, dal, mustard oil, flattened rice, and salt. The quantity was calculated for 21 35 days.
- Drought relief was undertaken in Manikpur Block, Chitrakoot district of Uttar Pradesh and Khalwa Block, Khandwa district of Madhya Pradesh.
  - o Safe drinking water distributed among 589 families of 4 villages of Manikpur block of Chitrakoot District, Uttar Pradesh State and 379 families of 7 villages of Khalwa block in Khandwa District of Madhya for a period of one month by using water tankers.
  - Provision of safe drinking water saved many lives from dehydration and it has prevented them from water borne diseases.
  - o 1937 livestock rescued by timely support of fodder to 563 farmers from 25 targeted villages of Bundelkhand region that were affected by drought.
  - o Provided nutrition supplements to 250 pregnant women and lactating mothers and 200 malnourished children to sustain their health during severe drought.

### **Impact Story**



Tara Devi, 65 year old widow from Basippatti Gram Panchayat, Bihar was surviving on her income earned by working as daily labourer and the widow pension she received as she has no one to take care of her. To make matters worse, on 20th July 2016 flood swept away all her belongings and destroyed her house, cut her off from local communication and market accessibility. Also mobility to even relief camps was not possible as there was an inadequate wooden boat for evacuation. During the flood situation she could not even have access to cooked food from relief camp and had to survive more than a week with a small quantity of beaten rice given by her neighbours from relief camp. Being an aged widow and staying alone she had lost hope of survival but the timely provision of EFICOR's relief food item provided her food security for two months.

### Centre for Policy Studies and Advocacy (CPSA)

CPSA works with Climate Action Network- South Asia (CAN-SA) to address issues of climate change both at policy and at grassroot levels. Besides creating awareness on climate issues by conducting programme and chat sessions, CPSA has undertaken new initiative of conducting an organizational environment audit during the financial year 2016-2017. The focus of the audit was on two sectors of energy and transportation through online survey among the 105 staff of EFICOR to evaluate EFICOR's carbon footprint during 2016 and to suggest ways to reduce the organisational carbon footprint and to improve environmental management practices.


- 564 participants attended the fifteen awareness programmes conducted on issues of climate change in different parts of India.



### Peace Building Project

EFICOR's Peace building projects in Jharkhand and Manipur organized Peace workshop, formed Peace Committees from target community.

#### Achievements: Key Highlights

- Peace Committees formed in 9 villages in Sahibgani District.
- The Peace Joint Venture Committee (JVC) organized a football tournament in Sahibgani District which 13 teams participated.
- 5 Joint ventures have been finalized at Jetkey and Bishanpur Location - Well renovation, Pond renovation, Social Forestry.
- 8 new Self Help Groups (SHGs) formed and one SHG opened a bank account with an accumulated saving of Rs. 11060 during one quarter.
- Peace gardens were prepared in several villages in Sahibganj District where both the Santhal and Malto tribes worked together and harvested 75 kilograms of Potatoes inspite of scarcity of water during the growing season.
- 2 Days Manipur State level peace workshops were conducted. 35 Faith Based leaders from all the 29 Associations under the MBC participated.

### **Organisational Effectiveness:** Organisational Development

EFICOR conducted Community of Practice sessions twice during the Social Workers Training, and during the Staff Conference to capture the knowledge at the grass-roott. Each project staff displayed and shared their achievements and their learning to others and they could learn from one another on good practices. The Unit also facilitated Organisational Development Training for various stakeholders. The Unit worked on External Communication Guidelines, reviewed of the Child Protection Policy and Anti Sexual Harassment Policy which was approved by the Board.


Income under major heads in the past three years




Expenditure under major heads for the past three years

The Board and Society Members actively participated as resource persons in EFICOR trainings and in other programmes.


