

Livelihood and Food security

- 11,540 families facilitated access to government social security schemes such as Pensions, Public Distribution System, Housing, Toilets, Income Generation Programs through our interventions.
- 1,734 households reported increased household annual income due to increased crop production and alternate livelihood options.
- **6,227** families practicing Climate Adaptive Agriculture as a result of awareness and training sessions given to farmers.
- 11,416 families practicing kitchen gardening contributing to nutritious intake at household level.
- 1,549 families access safe drinking water and domestic use through well deepening.
- **241** active Self-Help Groups (SHG)with total savings of INR **44,11,700**. The SHGs have accessed INR 1,11,12,000 bank loans for income generation. The SHG has disbursed internal loans to 169 members as internal loans for emergency needs and livelihoods.
- 45 families started home-based shops, earning livelihoods without daily labor work.
- **704** families were engaged in cash-for-work in villages through project works which provided employment for the families raising an income between INR 5,000 to 7,000 for each of the families.

From Child Bride to Entrepreneur: Anusha's Journey to Independence and Dignity

Anusha, 21. from Kommanapalli village, Bhadradri Kothagudem Telangana, was married off at 15 as the eldest of three children family. poor Struggling with the new responsibilities, her health deteriorated, leading to her divorce. After returning to her parents' home,



resisted their attempts to remarry her.

She came to know about the Youth For Development Project of EFICOR and soon became an active member of the youth club organised by the project.

She learned about their livelihood support. As a candidate meeting the criteria of vulnerability, she was provided with materials worth INR 10,000 as seed to start a grocery shop in her village.

Anusha now earns INR200 a day, using part of it to buy new materials and supporting her parents with the rest. This small support has given her not just financial independence but also a sense of dignity and acceptance in her community.

Water, Hope, and Growth: Teji Singh Gond's Farming Revival

Teji Singh Gond, 51, is a daily wage worker from Meghawakhurd village. He is a project participant of the Damoh Watershed and Food Security Project in Damoh in Madhya Pradesh. He has two sons and a daughter. His wife, Buddhi Bai, passed away two years ago from stomach cancer, leaving the family in a tough spot. Despite owning 4.5 acres of

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land, a lack of water made farming impossible.

Ten years ago, Teji dug a small pit for rainwater collection, but it wasn't enough to meet the water requirements. Recently, through the Village Watershed Committee, the pit transformed was into an open well, providing water for his crops. With

project support, Teji

received training in water budgeting and soil conservation. For the first time, he cultivated two crops—paddy and chickpea using his learning bringing in a profit of huge margin. Teji is thrilled with the improvements in his agriculture and income. He now looks forward to a better life, thanks to the new techniques, skills, and knowledge he has gained.

Public Health

- **36.3%** increase in Antenatal Care visits from baseline reported across our Mother and Child Health Projects.
- **5,662** safe births facilitated in health facilities.
- 916 high-risk pregnant mothers referred to district hospitals and recovered.
- **2,347** children with diarrhea and 949 with pneumonia received treatment timely and recovered.
- Through our interventions promoting sanitation and hygiene, 11,578 households are using toilets, 13,716 households practiced handwashing with soap during critical occasions, reducing the risk of infections, 10,434 households are treating water effectively as prevention against diarrheal diseases.
- 379 children Severely Acute Malnourished children referred to Nutrition Rehabilitation Centres and their health improved.

Umakanti's Triumph

Umakanti Bhoi and her husband, Nirupam Bhoi live in Tankapani, a village in the Balangir district of Odisha and work as daily wage labourers. At 18, Umakanti faced motherhood without adequate knowledge and support, which resulted in complications caused by anaemia.

The Unnati Mother and Child Health project team started visiting Umakanti regularly providing awareness, and other pregnancy related information. They encouraged her to opt for an institutional delivery. On June 17, 2023, she delivered a baby girl weighing 1 kg in a government hospital. Thanks to swift action and specialised care at the Special Newborn Care Unit, the baby's health gradually improved.



The project team provided ongoing support at home, educating Umakanti on kangaroo care and breastfeeding. Their guidance led to life-saving results, with the baby now weighing a healthy 7.1 kg at nine months.

Humanitarian Response and Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR)

- 9,788 families affected by heat waves, cold waves, floods and conflicts were supported with relief across 8 states in India.
- 15,000 disaster-affected families equipped with disaster preparedness plan.
- 974 Task Force members in 60 villages are equipped to help the communities during disaster through early warning, and safe evacuation.
- 1,170 flood prone households can access safe and clean drinking water from 20 high-raised tube wells constructed.
- DRR funds of INR 9,54,499 contributed are saved as contingency funds under the

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supervision of Disaster Management Committees (DMC).

• 439 school children trained on school safety plans and preparedness plans on DRR.

Alleviating the suffering of those affected by Disaster



Mrs. Chandini, is a 26-year-old resident of Usmanpur, Delhi. She suffers from 90% disability. In July 2023, Delhi and most parts of North India were affected by severe floods. For those like Chandini, the disaster increased their vulnerability. Her family was trapped as water levels rose to 13 feet. Rescued by the National Disaster Relief Force, they lost their home and all belongings. For five days, they survived by begging until moved to a shelter.

In this situation, the EFICOR task

force met Chandini's family during a survey to identify the vulnerable people in the community. As a vulnerable person affected by disaster, she was provided a relief kit containing essential items for a month. This comprehensive kit included food and non-food items for those affected by the disaster.

Upon receiving the relief kit, Mrs. Chandini was moved to tears. She expressed profound gratitude, noting that while people were provided with cooked food in the relief camps, being able to prepare and share meals at home restored a sense of family atmosphere that was deeply meaningful to her. "I am immensely thankful to EFICOR because they included small yet essential items in the relief kit, like the candle and matchstick."

Urban Poverty

• 1,205 persons facilitated access to government entitlements such as widow pension, old age pension, disability pension, ladli yojana, and housing schemes in urban slums of Delhi.

- **3,321** families accessing to proper water and sanitation facilities.
- 155 children at risk have found a safe environment through the child development centers promoting health, hygiene, and safety.
- 315 migrant families have sustainable livelihood options after our project intervention.

Peace Building

- Through our Peace intiatives in Jharkhand, Joint Venture Committees (JVC) comprised of members from the Malto and Santhal communities are working for peace and development in their communities.
- Identifying connectors that bring both communities together, Peace Football Tournaments organised with participation from **72** teams.
- **45** joint venture activities such as pond renovation, cattle vaccination, and football ground levelling were completed through the support of both communities.
- 7,730 plants were planted in each other's land and taken care of mutually by the communities.
- Forest regeneration techniques have led to increase of trees across **613** plots of land covering **593** acres.

Bridging Communities: The Legacy of Rupa Pahadiya

Rupa Pahadiya, 52, was a respected leader in Mathio Mako Village, Sahibganj district of Jharkhand known for fostering harmony between the Malto and Santhal communities. As a village head, religious leader, and advocate for unity, he worked to bridge historical divisions and promote mutual respect. Rupa was a key figure in the Joint Venture Committee and actively encouraged peace and understanding between both communities.

On March 9, 2024, Rupa Pahadiya left this world, leaving behind a legacy that would transcend lifetimes. His passing was not just mourned by his community but felt deeply across the neighbouring Santhal villages as well.



In a heartwarming show of unity, the Santhal community stood alongside their Malto brethren to honor Rupa Pahadiya. His legacy cotinues to remind both communities that 16 > ANNUAL REPORT 2023 - 2024



peace is a tangible reality, achievable through mutual respect. As Rupa said, "It's not our differences that define us, but our capacity to embrace and uplift one another," a truth he lived by.

Anti Human Trafficking

Through an interception team, **410** potential/suspected trafficking cases were intercepted at New Delhi railway station and referred to partner organisations working in rescue/legal formalities and rehabilitation.

Training and Capacity Building

The Training and Capacity Building Department has expanded its impact across 18 states, working with different communities and institutions. Through strategic partnerships and dedicated local trainers, we've empowered communities to access government schemes, collaborate through faith-based institutions, promote environmental care, and support trauma healing initiatives.

Sahbhagita Training

- The concept of Sahbhagita, meaning "working together," emphasises collaboration and community engagement for sustainable outcomes.
- Active in 16 districts and 6 clusters, in Jharkhand and Bihar.
- **7,034** individuals (**3,877** Males and **3,157** Females) trained to engage with communities,
- **33,804** people benefitted through various government schemes and community-led initiatives across **976** communities.

Social Worker Training Programme

- Through the Social Worker Training (SWT) program, we trained and equipped **160** (**109** Males & **51** Females) grassroot level individuals to effectively engage in community development in Bihar, Maharashtra and Delhi.
- **46,267** people benefited through the works of SWT trainees who through effective community mobilisation processes are addressing community needs, especially in accessing government schemes.

From Desperation to Stability: Bijay Manji's Journey to a Secure Home in Tikuliya

In Tikuliya, Fast Champaran. Bihar. most residents work as labourers and often seek construction jobs outside the village. Bijay Manji and his family live in a fragile mud house, which becomes problematic during the rainy season. With limited income, they frequently half their earnings for makeshift repairs that are insufficient against heavy rains.



Although Bijay Manji and his family were eligible for government assistance under Awas Yojna since 2021, their application was overlooked. Desperate, Bijay migrated to earn money for a new house, leaving his family in a difficult situation. Hiralal, an SWT participant, discovered the issue while surveying Tikuliya and helped eight families, including the Manjis, reapply. In June 2023, they received ₹1,20,000 each for house construction. With this support, Bijay built a secure home, and his family now lives safely, focusing on their livelihoods and saving for the future.

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Community Transformation Training Programme

• 6 Community Transformation Training conducted and 171 trained (120 male and 51 Female). Equipped and empowered trainees effectively engaged in facilitating community transformation through community mobilisation process.

Trauma Healing

- 82 healing groups held through facilitators trained by EFICOR.
- 850 individuals (354 male and 496 female) attended the workshop.

Creation Care

- Over **15,000** people reached through messages on caring for creation.
- 89 trainers equipped to facilitate workshops on creation care.
- **9,253** children through school awareness programs on caring for the environment leading to formation of green clubs.

A Trainer's Journey



Adam Mahanand from Udalguri District, Assam, was deeply inspired by creation care during his Social Worker training in 2019-20. He came back in 2023 to be trained as a trainer. Talking about his journey, Adam says "Before my experience at EFICOR, I was indifferent to environmental care, seeing it as someone else's responsibility. But I realised that as a Christian, it's part of my discipleship to nurture and safeguard

the environment. I decided to do whatever I could." In the last year, he organised 7 workshops and 8 awareness sessions, leading to notable outcomes - his faith-community adopted banana leaves as plates, reducing plastic usage, cleanliness

drives through which over 100 kg of trash was cleaned, a 100-meter drain was cleaned, 3 schools went plastic-free and school students launched 'Saturdays for Planet'. Tree plantation drives are underway.

We are grateful for people like Adam who continue the ripple effect of caring for creation through their passionate work and commitment.

- Service Providers: 140 (62 male, 78 female)
- Training: 528 total training days; 40 staff (31 male, 9 female) completed online courses on various topics.

- Core Humanitarian Standard certification renewed (valid from November 22, 2023, to November 21, 2026).


Internships

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
